Cambridge wins Maple Street grant

Cambridge recently received \$15,000 in state funding to start a new comprehensive, long-term residential revitalization project known as Maple Street.

Part of the Main Street Maryland program, Maple Street aims to strengthen the relationship between downtown commercial districts and surrounding neighborhoods by promoting affordable housing, community beautification, home ownership, public safety, and historic preservation.

Cambridge's Maple Street project will focus on key blocks of Pine, High,

Muir, and Gay streets near the downtown commercial district.

The project will be organized along the same lines as Cambridge Main Street. It will be overseen by a board of community volunteers and directed by a paid residential revitalization director. Maple Street and Main Street will often work in partnership and share expertise.
