With all the recent national TV coverage Cambridge has had, will we just be a blip on the screen with our 15 minutes of fame? Or will this have an impact? Time will tell, but already, Jimmie & Sook's reports that people are making special trips to Cambridge—from Pennsylvania, from Ohio, and elsewhere—just to come to the restaurant after seeing it on TV. They're asking for photos with owner Amanda Bramble. Emails are coming

in from all over, from Vermont to California, saying what an inspiration Amanda is. And the J&S t-shirts are flying out the door.

If you haven't heard or seen yet, Cambridge has been appearing on TV screens around the nation in the past two weeks. No, there wasn't a big fire or natural disaster (thank goodness). Tom Brokaw was here for a few days in April, and the result was this: Amanda Bramble, owner of Jimmie & Sook's Raw Bar and Grill, was the first "American Character Along Highway 50" featured on USA Network, and then on the Today Show and CNBC. Each month, Brokaw will feature another individual in a town along Route 50. And in early 2010, they'll all be part of a documentary. In addition, Brokaw also featured J.M. Clayton, one of the oldest crab houses, in a NBC Nightly News segment about challenges facing the crab industry.



Steel beams removed; Race Street slated to return to two-way traffic

The steel beams and concrete blocks that were part of a stabilization system for the fire-damaged




building at 444-448 Race Street have been removed. It's unclear at this point whether or not Race Street will return to two-way traffic. The street had been temporarily made one-way to allow space around the concrete blocks. Plans are in the works to re-install, perhaps at a new site, the mosaic mural that was constructed on panels at the front of the building. Damaged by a January 2008 fire, the building was home to two antiques businesses, one of which has reopened as Backfin Antiques on Washington Street.
