Juneteenth offers music, history on June 14

With live music, dancing, a look back at local history. and more, downtown Cambridge will celebrate Juneteenth on Second Saturday, June 14.

Juneteenth is now celebrated in more than half of U.S. states as a way for communities to come together and honor the African-American experience.

So come join in the June 14 festivities organized by Cambridge Main Street, the Harriet Tubman Organization, and the Elks Lodge on Pine Street. And stop in the stores that will stay open through the

evening. All events are free and open to the public. While details are still being finalized, here's what's planned so far:

12 p.m. Cambridge-South Dorchester Gospel Choir performs in Cannery Way (400 block of Race Street).

12 p.m. Starting at noon, start collecting flashcards from participating merchants that feature Dorchester County's African-American heroes. The first person to collect the complete set of cards will receive \$50 in Main Street dollars. Supplies are limited, so collect your cards early!
