# Speak out on liquor licenses

The last chance for citizens to speak up before the county liquor board on an issue critical to our downtown revitalization effort is Monday, Oct. 20. That board is trying to decide whether to support one of two different proposals to amend a state law that restricts liquor licenses within 300 feet of a church.

The issue arose over a specific restaurant proposed for 450 Race Street, but the law has the potential to affect any number of future projects as well. Its effect is to limit downtown's ability to gain the jobs and tax revenues and public-safety benefits that quality restaurants offer our downtown.

There are two ways to speak up on this issue. Submit a letter before Oct. 20 by mail to the Dorchester County Board of License Commissioners, 501 Court Lane, Room 101, Cambridge, MD 21613 or by e-mail to liquor inspector James Lurz at jlurz@council.docogonet.com. Or you can speak up at the last in a series of public hearings on this issue on Monday, Oct. 20 at 6 p.m. at the County Office Building.

#### Rendezvous with the schooners Oct. 24-26

For the third year, the Schooner Rendezvous brings schooners, tall ships, and other historic vessels to Long Wharf Park. The Oct. 24–26 maritime festival includes dockside tours (some of them free) and day sails

(for \$20 to \$40 per person, depending on ship) on both Saturday and Sunday, along with bluegrass and maritime music throughout. Plus a cocktail fundraising reception and the chance to enjoy an Eastern-Shore style dinner with the ships' captains and crew. More than a dozen ships are expected, including the

schooners *Pride of Baltimore II, Mystic Whaler, Mystic, Virginia,* and *Martha White.* The idea is to remind people of the important role these ships played in Cambridge's maritime and economic history.
