Liquor Board seeks public input Sept. 10

On Wednesday, Sept. 10, the **Dorchester Liquor Board will** listen to public comment on proposals that aim to boost the number of jobs and improve public safety in our downtown. Right now, Cambridge's ability to attract restaurants is limited by a state law that restricts the issuance of liquor licenses within 300 feet of a church. Many other counties in Maryland have successfully worked their way through local government to ask the state legislature to grant exceptions to this law in an effort to promote economic development and revitalization.

In Cambridge, we're asking the Liquor Board to consider recommending that the County Council endorse such a strategy here for full-fledged restaurants in our downtown. It's the first step in a process that could bring some exciting projects into downtown Cambridge. The Sept. 10 meeting is your chance to speak out on this important issue. It starts at 5 p.m. in the County Office Building (501 Court Lane).

Additional hearings will be held Sept. 17 in East New Market and Sept. 24 on Taylors Island.
