The Cambridge Lives! project took a major step forward on Nov. 6-7, when more than 50 community residents, stakeholders, and leaders gathered over two days to discuss ways to spark a revitalization process along Pine and nearby streets.

Held at historic Bethel AME Church on Pine Street, the event featured training sessions led by Donya Maria Twyman and Cynthia Salvo of Virtual Office Associates (VOA), a community-planning consulting firm based in Annapolis. VOA's goal is to help establish and empower an independent volunteer steering committee to help identify community priorities and then work with various potential funders and other partners to make projects become a reality.



"It's been a great process, rolling up the sleeves along with so many other groups in an effort to seek community input and then identify and then pursue the right programs," said Jim Duffy, Main Street's executive director. Danny Doughty, a folk artist whose work was recently on display at Joie de Vivre, has decided to set some roots in Cambridge. He has taken over the back space at Joie de Vivre (where Dazzle Your Domaine used to be) and is offering a sneak preview of the new Danny Doughty Gallery on Second Saturday, Nov. 14. Doughty lives in the same house where he was born

and raised in the small village of Willis Wharf on the Virginia Eastern Shore. He says this isolated area, slow to change with the rest of the world, has been the catalyst for his distinctive "naive" style of painting.

Buck Doughty creates metal sculptures, welded, pounded and ground to shape from raw steel materials. His creations, ranging from a small object (such as a clam) to a full-size depiction of a

pine branch, are inspired by his native area's rural settings.




